1. Minutes

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of November 2, 2015 were approved as written by motion of Trustee Chamberlin, seconded by Trustee Wikman; carried, Deputy Mayor Skelton, Trustees Chamberlin, Wikman and Moriarty voting yes, none opposed.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Erie County Legislature Chairman John Mills updated the Board on the following;

- ❖ No increase in Erie County property taxes.
- ❖ Scenic Byway to be extended all the way to Ellicottville.
- ❖ Bob Lenartz is now working part-time in Legislator Mills' office working on grant funding projects.

2. Elgin Surplus/
Sale Motion was made by Trustee Moriarty, seconded by Trustee Chamberlin; Deputy Mayor Skelton, Trustees Moriarty, Chamberlin and Wikman voting yes, none opposed to declare surplus and approve the sale of the 2003 Elgin Streetsweeper VIN#49HAADB83DK83552. This surplus streetsweeper will be sold to the Village of Bergen via inter-municipal sale in the amount of \$25,000.
3. 34.5 Change
Order Motion was made by Trustee Moriarty, seconded by Trustee Chamberlin; Deputy Mayor Skelton, Trustees Moriarty, Chamberlin and Wikman voting yes, none opposed to approve Change Order #1 to TRC Solutions for Planning and Engineering Design Services for the 34.5 kV Sub-transmission project in the amount of \$38,920.

Deputy Mayor Skelton reminded everyone that there will be a public hearing on the matter of the need for Mercy EMS in the Village of Springville on December 2nd at 6:30 pm and the Springville Griffith High School.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 2015-19

**RESOLUTION OF THE VILLAGE OF SPRINGVILLE
DECLARING THE EXISTENCE OF PUBLIC NEED AND SUPPORTING THE APPLICATION
OF MERCY EMS SEEKING PRIMARY OPERATING AUTHORITY WITHIN THE VILLAGE
FROM THE NEW YORK STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH BUREAU OF EMS AND THE
WYOMING-ERIE REGIONAL EMS COUNCIL.**

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authority conferred upon the Village of Springville (“Village”) by General Municipal Law Section 122-b, the Village has the authority to provide for general ambulance services, prehospital emergency medical treatment, and transportation of sick and injured persons (referred to herein collectively as “ambulance and emergency medical services”) within the boundaries of the Village and,

WHEREAS, the provision of ambulance and emergency medical services to the residents of the Village of Springville is an appropriate matter for concern and deliberation by the Village Board of Trustees, and

WHEREAS, prior to September 23, 2015 ambulance and emergency medical services were provided in the Village by the Village of Springville Fire Department and by Rural Metro ambulance service which also provided advanced life support services and,

WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees is aware that the Village Fire Department is encountering difficulties in maintaining staffing necessary to provide the level of emergency medical care that is required in the Village and,

WHEREAS, although Rural Metro provides ambulance and emergency medical services that augment those provided by the Village Fire Department, said services are not being provided at a level commensurate with the needs of the Village and,

WHEREAS, by correspondence dated July 29, 2015 Rural Metro advised the Town Board of the Town of Concord that its interpretation of its contract with the Town does not obligate Rural Metro to staff an ambulance within the Town and,

WHEREAS, as a consequence of Rural Metro not providing ambulance and emergency medical services to the Village at a level commensurate with the needs of the Village, excessive demands to provide these services were placed on the Village of Springville Fire Department, further compounding the strain on that agency to provide ambulance and emergency medical services that should be provided by Rural Metro and,

WHEREAS, with the current resources available to the Village Fire Department and the expectation that such limitations will exist into the foreseeable future, the Village Board of Trustees anticipates that the fire service ambulance providers will be unable to compensate for the expected increases in ambulance and emergency medical services responses caused by Rural Metro staffing and availability limitations, and,

WHEREAS, by correspondence dated July 29, 2015, Rural Metro advised the Chief Executive Officer of the Bertrand Chaffee Hospital located in the Village of Springville that it was terminating its transportation contract with the Hospital effective August 26, 2015 and,

WHEREAS, in the aforesaid correspondence, Rural Metro stated that it is not economically feasible for Rural Metro to provide 24-hours-per day, 7-days-per week advanced life support coverage in the Village of Springville and Town of Concord, as the 911 transports and Hospital transports are not sufficient to justify Rural Metro providing such staffing and,

WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees recognizes the value and benefit that the provision of consistent and reliable 24-hour-per day, 7-days-per week ambulance and advanced life support coverage provides to the health and safety of the citizens of and visitors to the Village of Springville, and,

WHEREAS, Rural Metro declared in separate letters to the Concord Town Board and Bertrand Chaffee Hospital that it is either unable or unwilling to provide the level of emergency medical and ambulance services that the Village Board of Trustees has determined are both needed and justified in the Village of Springville, and,

WHEREAS, it is the position of the Village Board of Trustees that, after careful deliberation, the circumstances created an “emergency need” and a “public need” for the addition of ambulance and emergency medical services and advanced life support providers as those terms are utilized by the Department of Health Bureau of EMS, and,

WHEREAS, on August 31, 2015, the Board of Trustees determined that the then-existing status of ambulance and emergency medical services in the Village was an immediate and obvious threat to the health and safety of residents of the Village and thereby constituted an “emergency need” for the provision of such services as described in Public Health Law Section 3010(1)(c), and,

WHEREAS, Public Health Law Section 3010(1)(c) provides that Emergency Operating Authority may be granted to an ambulance service provider “upon express approval of the department and the appropriate regional emergency medical services council for a maximum of sixty days if necessary to meet an emergency need” and,

WHEREAS, the New York State Bureau of Emergency Medical Services and the Wyoming-Erie Regional Emergency Medical Services Council granted Emergency Operating Authority to Mercy EMS effective September 23, 2015, and

WHEREAS, since September 23, 2015, Mercy EMS has provided the staffing and level of care commensurate with the needs of the Village and necessary as a consequence of the obvious deficiencies in the consistency and level of emergency care that was being provided in the Village before September 23, 2015 and,

WHEREAS, Mercy EMS does not currently possess permanent operating authority to provide ambulance and emergency medical care in the Village of Springville, but has expressed and demonstrated its willingness to provide the necessary services in the Village that were lacking prior to September 23, 2015, and has applied for Permanent Operating Authority within the boundaries of the Village, and,

WHEREAS, since September 23, 2015, Mercy EMS has provided consistent and reliable 24-hour-per day, 7-day-per week ambulance and advanced life support coverage to the citizens and visitors to the Village of Springville, and has satisfied the glaring emergency need and public need that existed in the Village before September 23, 2015, and

WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees has determined that public need for the level and manner of service currently provided by Mercy EMS exists and will continue to exist upon the expiration of the term of Mercy EMS’ emergency operating authority, and

WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees has determined that it is in the best interests of the citizens of the Village to have Mercy EMS continue to provide the consistent and reliable 24-hour-per day, 7-day-per week ambulance and advanced life support coverage to the citizens and visitors to the Village of Springville that it has provided since September 23, 2015,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Springville, as the governing body of the Village, does hereby declare that “public need” exists for the provision of ambulance and advanced life support services in the Village as a result of the insufficiency and inadequacy of the ambulance and advanced life support services that were provided in the Village prior to September 23, 2015, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any reduction of the level or manner of care currently provided by Mercy EMS pursuant to its emergency operating authority will create an immediate and obvious threat to the health and safety of residents of the Village, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Springville, as the governing body of the Village, hereby declares that “public need” exists for the provision of ambulance and advanced life support services in the Village as a result of the insufficiency and inadequacy of the ambulance provided prior to September 23, 2015 and the provisional manner of service being provided, thereby creating an immediate and obvious threat to the health and safety of residents of the Village and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that as a precursor to Mercy EMS being permanently authorized to initiate ambulance and advanced life support services to ameliorate the “public need” described above, the Village Board of Trustees endorses and supports the application of Mercy EMS, to conduct ambulance and advanced life support services in the Village of Springville and for Mercy EMS to provide such services on a permanent basis as soon as possible and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Village Board of Trustees authorizes and acknowledges its unconditional support for the application of Mercy EMS for permanent operating authority before the Department of Health Bureau of EMS and the Wyoming-Erie Regional EMS Council, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Village Board of Trustees authorizes the Village Mayor to prepare and execute such documents as may be necessary to assist and to effect Mercy EMS’ efforts to establish and provide for the provision of ambulance and advanced life support services in the Village of Springville and to obtain permanent operating authority on behalf of Mercy EMS.

5. LL 2015-3 Intro Motion was made by Trustee Wikman, seconded by Trustee Moriarty; carried, Deputy Mayor Skelton, Trustees Wikman, Moriarty and Chamberlin voting yes, none opposed to introduce LL 2015-3 the proposed amendment to Chapter 180 Vehicles and Traffic Code as well as set the Public Hearing on the matter on December 7, 2015 at 7:00 pm. Advertisements will be placed in the appropriate publication.
6. Well request At this time Karl Fruehauf of 276 E. Main Street addressed the Board regarding his desire to have a water well drilled on his property. After discussion the Village’s denial of Mr. Fruehauf’s request was explained. The denial is based on several reasons one of which is that the drilling of a well on this property would be against NYS Health Department code. Superintendent Kostowniak explained that Mr. Fruehauf can expect correspondence from the Village explaining the denial of his request.
7. Timothy L. Horner Resolution Motion was made by Trustee Moriarty, seconded by Trustee Wikman; carried, Deputy Mayor Skelton, Trustees Moriarty, Wikman and Chamberlin voting yes, none opposed to approving the below resolution.

Whereas Timothy L. Horner was born in Altoona PA and moved to Tonawanda NY where he graduated from high school, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner received a Bachelor's of Science Degree in Business Management from the University of Buffalo, having completed programs of study in business and accounting at Canisius College and Bryant and Stratton, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner served in the United States Air Force 38th Tactical Missile Wing in the Air Police Squadron as a law enforcement officer in the K-9 and undercover surveillance divisions at Sembach Germany from 1963-1966, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner has 10 years of experience in the insurance industry working as treasurer, and financial and account managers for Merchants Insurance Group, Russell Bond Company, and LoVollo Associates, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner, his late wife Mary Kathleen, and his children Elizabeth and Daniel moved from Kenmore to Springville in 1987, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner worked for 7 years in the building industry working as billing supervisor, comptroller, financial, and personnel consultant for Benderson Development, Delcon Kitchen and More, and Springville Door and Window, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner was appointed the first Administrator of the Village of Springville on August 16, 1999, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner prepared annual budgets for the Village General Fund, Water, Sewer, and Electric Divisions, which kept property taxes and fees under 2% annual increase while providing capital improvements and increased services to the Village residents, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner effectively sought and managed over \$6 million of grants to fund various capital improvement projects including water treatment and delivery services, waste water sewer and treatment improvements, park creation, street scape improvements, modernization of Village Office services, and improvements to the Municipal Parking Lot, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner has increased public safety in the Village by administering projects that created a Village Police force, expanded the Erie County Sheriff's presence in the Village, created a Village Court, remodeled and updated Springville Control Center, purchased new firefighting apparatus, planned an expanded public safety services at 65 Franklin, and secured a more efficient ambulance service for the Village, and

Whereas, Timothy L. Horner has served as the President of the Springville Kiwanis, a member of the Board of Directors of the Springville Area Chamber of Commerce, and the President and Chair of the Bertrand Chaffee Hospital Board, and was named the Springville Area Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year in 2003, and

Whereas, Timothy L. Horner served as the President of the New York State Municipal Finance Officers, a member of the Executive Board of Directors of the New York Conference of Mayors, and a member of the International Institute of Municipal Clerks, and,

Whereas Timothy L. Horner's motto strategically placed in the Village Office reads: *Live so that when others think of honesty, compassion, and integrity, they will think of you*, and

Whereas Timothy L. Horner in retirement will tour the United States in his RV with his love Sandy Weideman, and winter in Florida near his baby granddaughter Evie, now therefore let it be

Resolved that Timothy L. Horner has led the Village of Springville as an exemplary and distinguished Village Administrator, and be it further

Resolved that the Village Board of Trustees thanks Timothy L. Horner for his extraordinary and exemplary service to the community on behalf of the residents of the Village of Springville.
